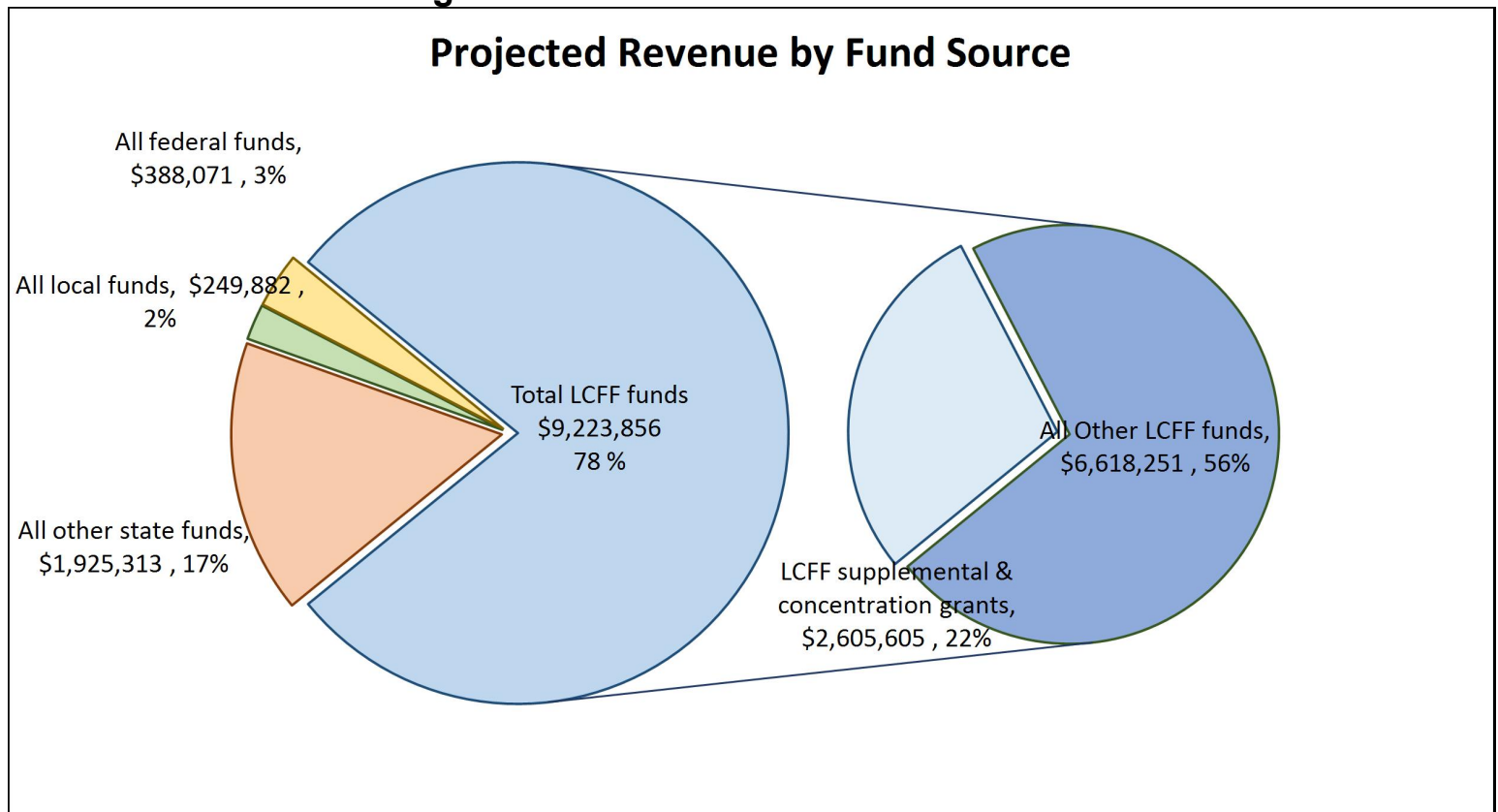

Budget Overview for the 2026-27 School Year

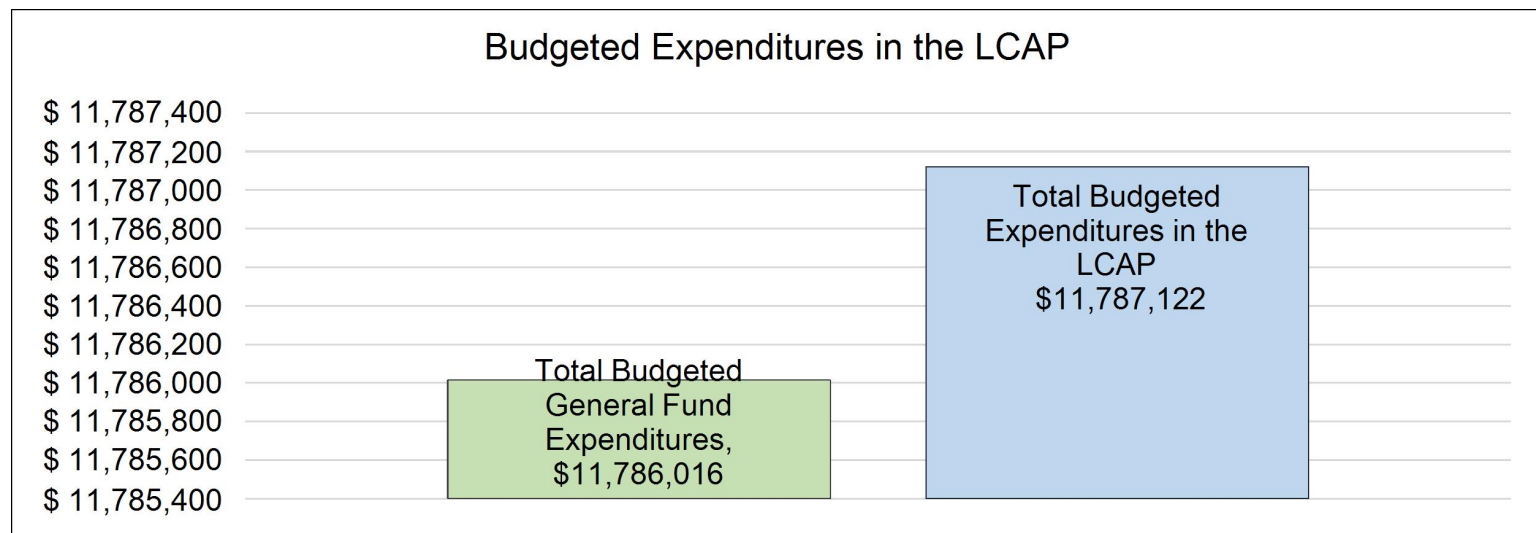


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Stella High Charter Academy expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for Stella High Charter Academy is \$11,787,122, of which \$9,223,856.00 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$1,925,313.00 is other state funds, \$249,882.00 is local funds, and \$388,071.00 is federal funds. Of the \$9,223,856.00 in LCFF Funds, \$2,605,605.00 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (Foster Youth, English learner, and low-income students).

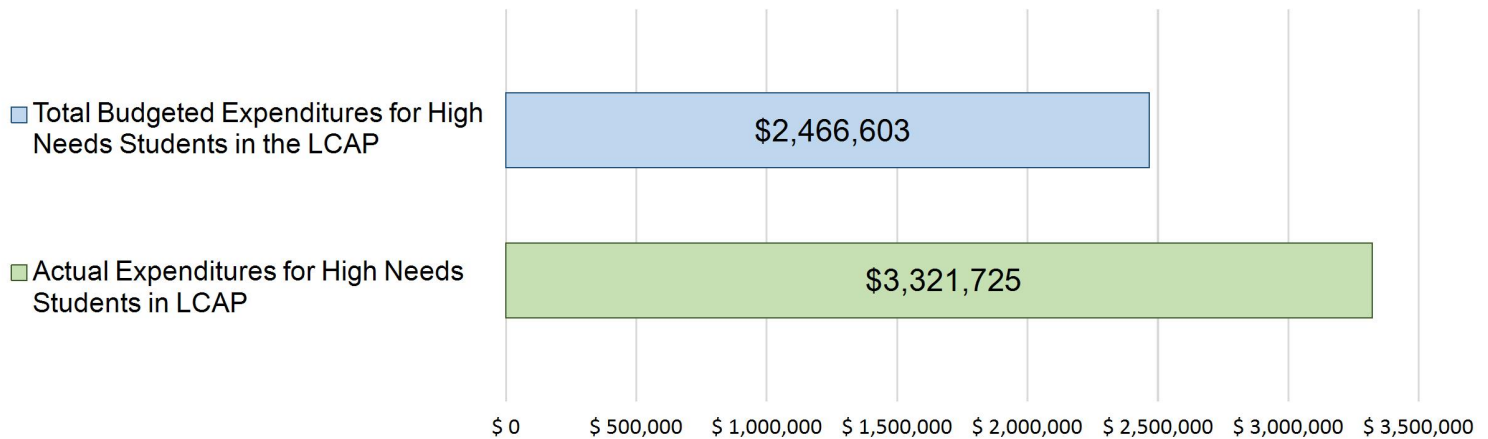

Plan Summary [2026-27]

General Information

Since opening our first school in 2003, Bright Star Schools has been building a high-quality transitional-kindergarten (TK) through 12th grade model for our families in each of our three communities. In nine, tuition-free public schools in three communities -- West Adams, Koreatown, and in the San Fernando Valley -- our 3,000+ students experience rigorous academics, inclusive education, social-emotional support, and rich life opportunities beyond the classroom.

The students at Stella High Charter Academy are predominantly from the South Los Angeles community, specifically near West Adams, Baldwin Hills and Inglewood. While the community is culturally rich the neighborhood does not have access to the breadth of resources many more affluent communities do. Additionally, many of our school's families have recently come to the United States, and in many cases English is not the primary language spoken at home. Approximately, 12.93% of our students are English learners, 95.50% of our students qualify for free and reduced priced meals, and 17.18% of our students are students with disabilities. These factors make the school's job of creating an educational program that is centered around the specific needs of the community and filled with experiences and rich educational programming built to ensure student success.

At Bright Star Schools, we are guided by our core values and our highest ideals for our students, staff, and schools. The following are Bright Star Schools' Mission, Vision and Core Values.

Vision: Bright Star students will become leaders who act with integrity and champion equity to enrich our communities and the world.

Mission: At Bright Star Schools, our mission is to provide holistic, inclusive support for all students to achieve academic excellence and grow their unique talents so that they find joy and fulfillment in higher education, career, and life.

Core Values:

- Integridad - means we need to be the best versions of ourselves, to speak our own truth, and to advocate for those whose voices are not heard.

Reflections: Annual Performance

A reflection on annual performance based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

As we reflect on our annual performance, Bright Star Schools remains committed to evaluating our progress using data from the California School Dashboard and local assessments. Over the past year, we have celebrated notable achievements and acknowledge ongoing challenges and remain dedicated to refining our strategies to ensure equitable opportunities for all students. Based on the 2025 CA School Dashboard, our strengths and growth areas are as follows:

- Outstanding English Learner Progress: 59.0% of our English Learners made progress, receiving a Blue performance level with an increase of 25.7 percentage points. Our Long-Term English Learners also earned Blue, increasing 25.8% to 63.3% making progress toward English proficiency.
- High Graduation Rates Across Student Groups: The Graduation Rate Indicator is Green, with All Students graduating at 93.5% (maintained +0.8%). Student group performance also reflects strong outcomes, including Hispanic students at 93.5% (Green, increased 1.4%) and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students at 93.4% (Green, maintained 0.8%), indicating consistent success in supporting students to graduation.
- Positive College and Career Readiness Outcomes: The College/Career Indicator is Green, with 66.7% of All Students prepared (increased 2.4%). Student groups also demonstrated strong outcomes, including Hispanic students at 68.2% prepared (Green, increased 2.9%) and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students at 66.9% prepared (Green, increased 3.1%), reflecting continued progress in preparing students for postsecondary success.
- Low Suspension Rates with Strong Outcomes for Several Student Groups: Our Suspension Rate Indicator saw a decline of 2.1% moving to 1.7% of students suspended and earning a Green performance level which was an improvement from Orange in 2024. Several student groups demonstrated strong outcomes, including English Learners (0.0%, Blue, declined 3.5%), Hispanic students (0.4%, Blue, declined 1.9%), and Long-Term English Learners (0.0%, Blue, declined 4.1%). Additionally, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students (1.8%, Green, declined 2.2%) and Students with Disabilities (1.0%, Green, declined 5.4%) also showed positive trends.

- Improvement in Mathematics Achievement: While still below standard, Mathematics improved significantly for All Students, increasing 19.9 points to 93.7 points below standard (Yellow). Student group data shows similar growth, including English Learners (134.8 points below standard, Orange, increased 32.8 points), Hispanic students (86.8 points below standard, Yellow, increased 30.3 points), and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students (92.5 points below standard, Yellow, increased 23.1 points), reflecting accelerated improvement across groups.

We are very encouraged by the significant growth we've seen over the past year, as shown by our performance on the CA School Dashboard, however, we acknowledge the challenges we still face and the current opportunities for growth.

- Decline in English Language Arts Performance: While we still remain above standard in ELA, we saw a 7.5 point decline from the prior year moving to 11.3 points above standard. Student group data shows mixed performance, including English Learners (43.5 points below standard, Yellow, increased 7.2 points) being our only group of students that saw an increase, but declines for other groups such as Hispanic students (15.7 points above standard, Yellow, declined 2.2 points) and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students (9.8 points above standard, Yellow, declined 8.5 points).
- Suspension Rates for African American Students: While our African American students' suspension rate is at 7.5%, there are many positive indicators that highlight meaningful progress. The rate declined by 2.8 percentage points from the prior year, moving this student group out of the Red performance level and now below the state average.
- Graduation Rate for English Learners: English Learners achieved an 89.7% graduation rate, demonstrating that the large majority of students are successfully completing high school. This rate continues to be 10 percentage points above the state average for English Learners, highlighting the effectiveness of the school's supports for our multi-language learners. Although this reflects a slight decline and is two performance levels below All Students, it also underscores a strong foundation of systems and practices already in place.

Bright Star Schools values the ongoing engagement of educational partners as an essential component of the Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) development process. Throughout the year, the school gathered input from students, families, staff, school leaders, and community partners through surveys, meetings, data reviews, family conferences, and educational partner engagement sessions. Feedback from educational partners, combined with analysis of student achievement, school climate, attendance, and college and career readiness data, directly informed our planning for 2026-2027. Overall feedback from educational partners was positive, as reflected in stakeholder survey results that highlighted strong satisfaction with school culture, academic supports, communication, and student learning experiences.

- 94% of parents rated the school positively
- 96% of staff who rate positively the question "I understand how my role and my department contributes to the larger mission and vision of Bright Star Schools"
- 53% of students who feel safe at school (5 percentage points growth from baseline)
- 38% of students who feel like they belong at school (8 percentage point growth from baseline)

The following updates reflect priorities and recommendations identified through this collaborative engagement process.

Goal 1

Metric 1.14, College and Career Preparedness Update: 3-year target was met for all student groups in year 2 for this metric, so new 3-year targets have been set to account for the year 2 achievements.

Additionally, Stella High Charter Academy will implement refinements to specific actions to strengthen student achievement and college readiness systems. These include a redesign of the 9th grade seminar course to more intentionally support students' transition into high school and build the skills necessary for A-G completion, expanding the course beyond a primary focus on math to include broader academic and organizational supports. Additionally, the school will return to consistent use of CAASPP-aligned assessment resources, including Interim Assessment Blocks (IABs), administered during defined windows throughout the year to strengthen progress monitoring and data-driven instruction, including multiple administrations annually and targeted science assessments.

Goal 2:

Metric, 2.2, Suspension Rate Update: 3-year target was met for all student groups in year 2 for this metric, so new 3-year targets have been set to account for the year 2 achievements.

Metric 2.4, Dropout Rate Update: 3-year target was met for all student groups in year 2 for this metric, so new 3-year targets have been set to account for the year 2 achievements.

Stella High will begin Year 1 implementation of a new cell phone policy during the 2026–27 school year. School leaders recognize that the

initial implementation phase will involve ongoing reflection, adjustments, and learning as staff and students establish consistent expectations and routines designed to strengthen student engagement, focus, and school culture.

In order to improve our student belonging and safety results, the school will also engage in a course audit process to better align course offerings to student interests, postsecondary readiness, and real-world skill development. This includes exploration of expanded coursework and elective opportunities such as financial literacy and other high-interest areas that support student engagement and long-term success. Additionally, the school will continue providing ongoing professional development focused on student engagement strategies, instructional relevance, and creating meaningful learning experiences that increase student connection to classroom instruction and school overall.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

During the 2025–26 school year, all actions identified under Goal 1 were carried out as intended, with full implementation across each area and no substantive differences between planned and actual execution. The school maintained coherence between its strategic priorities and instructional practices, ensuring that key systems and supports were consistently delivered to students.

Staffing structures remained stable and aligned to program goals. General education classrooms were staffed with appropriately credentialed teachers, supporting consistent core instruction across grade levels. Services for students with disabilities were implemented as designed, including access to inclusive education teachers, school psychologists, and required direct services. English Learner supports were also delivered as planned, with designated personnel and aligned curriculum supporting language acquisition and access to grade-level content. In addition, the school maintained dedicated alumni and college success personnel, including an Alumni Coordinator who supported students

in postsecondary planning and transition, with a particular focus on low-income students and English Learners who are often first-generation college students.

Instructional programs continued to be supported through the use of adopted curriculum and the provision of necessary materials and supplies. Classrooms were equipped with standards-aligned resources, including AP textbooks and college readiness materials, allowing teachers to effectively implement lessons and provide differentiated learning experiences. The school also ensured access to key assessments and related supports, including AP, SAT, PSAT, and ACT exam fees and preparation resources, reducing financial barriers and expanding access to college and career pathways. Academic software and digital tools were utilized to support instruction, assessment, and progress monitoring, including platforms specifically designed to support college and career readiness. These systems enabled counselors and alumni support staff to monitor student progress, tailor supports, and track postsecondary outcomes.

Intervention systems were implemented to provide additional support for students requiring targeted assistance. Site-based staff coordinated intervention services, with a focus on English Learners and students with disabilities, ensuring alignment between identified student needs and instructional supports. These efforts were reinforced through regular data review and the use of assessment tools to inform instructional adjustments.

Ongoing professional learning and instructional support structures were also maintained throughout the year. Teachers engaged in professional development opportunities, and instructional leadership roles, inclusive of grade level leads, content leads, and support staff, played an active role in strengthening classroom instruction and supporting student learning. These efforts contributed to a more cohesive instructional program and increased support for unduplicated student groups, while also reinforcing college and career readiness as a central component of the high school experience.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The effectiveness of the actions under Goal 1 demonstrates meaningful progress across multiple indicators, with particularly strong gains in English Learner outcomes and Mathematics growth, alongside stable performance in English Language Arts (ELA) and continued strength in college and career readiness.

The strongest evidence of effectiveness is seen in the English Learner Progress Indicator (ELPI), where Stella High achieved a Blue performance level, with 59.0% of English Learners making progress with an increase of 25.7 percentage points. Long-Term English Learners similarly demonstrated strong outcomes, with 63.3% making progress, increasing by 25.8 percentage points. This significant growth reflects the impact of targeted English Learner supports (Action 4), including dedicated personnel, curriculum, and a focus on differentiated instruction and progress monitoring. These results indicate that the school has been highly effective in accelerating language acquisition and moving students toward English proficiency.

In English Language Arts, overall performance remains strong, with All Students performing at the Yellow level and 11.3 points above standard, though declining by 7.5 points we remain above standard and above the state average. Importantly, subgroup data reflects areas of both stability and growth. Hispanic and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students remained above standard (15.7 and 9.8 points above, respectfully), and English Learners showed improvement, increasing by 7.2 points, indicating positive movement despite remaining below standard. Students with Disabilities demonstrated notable growth, increasing 22.8 points, suggesting that inclusive supports and instructional strategies (Actions 2 and 6) are beginning to positively impact outcomes. These trends suggest that while there are areas for continued improvement, core instruction and supports (Actions 1, 3, and 8) are contributing to maintaining strong ELA performance and driving growth for key student groups.

Mathematics shows some of the most significant growth across student groups. All Students improved by 19.9 points, and key student groups demonstrated strong gains, including English Learners (+32.8 points), Hispanic students (+30.3 points), Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students (+23.1 points), Long-Term English Learners (+45.2 points), and Students with Disabilities (+34.6 points). These results highlight the effectiveness of strengthened instructional practices, curriculum implementation, and targeted interventions (Actions 3, 6, 7, and 8). While students remain below standard, the consistent upward movement across all major student groups demonstrates that these strategies are beginning to show accelerated learning.

College and Career readiness outcomes further demonstrate the effectiveness of the school's comprehensive support systems. Stella High achieved a Green performance level on the College/Career Indicator, with 66.7% of students prepared, an increase of 2.4 percentage points. Notably, English Learners increased to 61.5% prepared (+16.7%), Long-Term English Learners to 60.6% (+17.1%), and Students with Disabilities to 50.0% (+12.5%), indicating strong growth across historically underserved groups. These outcomes reflect the impact of college counseling, alumni support, and access to advanced coursework and assessments (Actions 9, 10, and 11), which are effectively supporting students in achieving postsecondary readiness.

In summary, Actions 4 (English Learner supports) and Actions 9–11 (college and career readiness systems) have been highly effective, as evidenced by strong ELPI and College/Career outcomes. Additionally, Actions 3, 6, 7, and 8 have contributed to meaningful growth in Mathematics across all student groups. While ELA performance remains strong overall, the recent decline indicates a need to further strengthen instructional practices to sustain and accelerate progress. Overall, the data reflects a positive trajectory, with clear evidence that the school's systems are driving growth, particularly for English Learners and other high-need student groups.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

Based on reflection on current year implementation and engagement with our educational partners, we will largely continue with the current strategies outlined in Goal 1. We are encouraged by the progress we have seen and believe that maintaining consistency in our approach will support continued growth toward our three-year targets in academic achievement for all students.

While maintaining the overall structure of our goals, metrics, and actions, we are making a few intentional updates to select metrics and

action steps to respond to partner feedback and enhance our ability to monitor progress and impact, we are making the following updates to Goal 1:

- Metric 1.14, College and Career Preparedness: 3-year target was met for all student groups in year 2 for this metric, so new 3-year targets have been set to account for the year 2 achievements.

Additionally, Stella High Charter Academy will implement refinements to specific actions to strengthen student achievement and college readiness systems. These include a redesign of the 9th grade seminar course to more intentionally support students' transition into high school and build the skills necessary for A-G completion, expanding the course beyond a primary focus on math to include broader academic and organizational supports. Additionally, the school will return to consistent use of CAASPP-aligned assessment resources, including Interim Assessment Blocks (IABs), administered during defined windows throughout the year to strengthen progress monitoring and data-driven instruction, including multiple administrations annually and targeted science assessments.

These refinements reflect a commitment to continuous improvement and more intentional alignment of instructional supports to student needs, while maintaining the overall LCAP framework.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

During the 2025–26 school year, all actions identified under Goal 2 were implemented as planned, with no substantive differences between the intended design and actual execution. The school maintained a consistent focus on fostering a positive, engaging, and supportive school culture while strengthening family engagement systems to ensure all students, particularly those in unduplicated student groups, had access to the social-emotional and community-based supports necessary for success.

Enrichment programming was implemented as intended, providing students with access to expanded learning opportunities beyond the core academic program. These included afterschool programming, Life Experience Lessons such as overnight field trips, and wellness-focused opportunities for both students and families. These experiences were designed to broaden student exposure to cultural and real-world learning opportunities and were particularly impactful for our significant student groups.

Student and family support structures were fully implemented through the coordination of counseling services, restorative practices, and student culture systems. School counseling staff, Deans of Student Affairs/Culture, and office support personnel worked collaboratively to provide students with consistent access to trusted adults who could support both academic and social-emotional needs. In alignment with Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant (LREBG) priorities, the school also expanded its capacity to support student wellness and mental health through increased counseling services and related supports. These efforts were aligned to identified needs in school climate data, including suspension and attendance trends, and were supported by ongoing monitoring of key metrics such as suspension rates, chronic absenteeism, and student survey data.

Technology systems supporting school culture were also implemented as planned, including platforms used to monitor attendance, behavior, and social-emotional data. These tools enabled staff to track trends, respond proactively to student needs, and support a more data-informed approach to school climate and engagement. At Stella High Charter Academy, implementation of these systems has been strong overall; however, staffing vacancies in roles that support school safety and culture impacted full execution and may influence initial survey outcomes. These challenges have helped identify areas for strengthening staffing stability to ensure consistent implementation and maximize the effectiveness of these tools moving forward.

Student activities and school-wide events were carried out as intended, contributing to a positive and inclusive school environment. These activities provided opportunities for student recognition, celebration, and community-building, reinforcing a strong sense of belonging among students.

Finally, our athletic programs were implemented as planned, offering students access to competitive sports and physical education. Athletics continued to serve as a vital outlet for student motivation, health, and teamwork, while also reinforcing a sense of belonging and school spirit.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

We had a material difference for Action 2.8. Estimated actual expenditures exceeded the original budget due to the expansion of athletics programming and increased student participation during the year, including costs associated with launching a football program and supporting related athletic activities.

The actions implemented under Goal 2 have been effective in strengthening student engagement, school culture, and family partnership, with positive outcomes across attendance, behavior, and family engagement indicators. Through restorative practices, targeted attendance systems, and expanded communication and outreach efforts, the school continues to foster a safe, supportive, and connected learning environment for students and families.

In terms of student engagement and school climate, the school demonstrated positive progress across multiple key indicators, including increases in attendance and reductions in chronic absenteeism and dropout rates:

Attendance Rate: Currently at 91.75% (increase from 90.72% baseline and 90.84% prior year)

Expulsion Rate: 0% across all student groups

Chronic Absenteeism: 29.4% (declined from 30.7%)

Dropout Rate: 2.4% (declined from 4.6%)

53% of students who feel safe at school (5 percentage points growth from baseline)

38% of students who feel like they belong at school (8 percentage point growth from baseline)

The school also earned a Green performance level for Suspension Rate on the California School Dashboard, reflecting the effectiveness of Action 2 (Student and Family Services Personnel) and the school's continued investment in restorative practices and proactive student supports. Staff implemented restorative responses to student behavior, including individualized interventions and structured family meetings, helping maintain a positive school climate while reducing exclusionary discipline practices. Internal school culture survey data also showed increases in students' perceptions of school safety, further reflecting the effectiveness of these efforts.

Additionally, the school demonstrated strong outcomes in long-term student engagement and postsecondary readiness, earning a Green performance level on the Graduation Rate indicator, with 93.5% of students graduating, exceeding the state average of 87.8%. English Learners graduated at 89.7%, 10 percentage points above the statewide English Learner graduation rate of 79.7%, while Students with Disabilities achieved a 100% graduation rate.

Attendance systems and interventions were also strengthened this year through more consistent implementation and monitoring. The school increased the fidelity of attendance interventions by restructuring family meeting processes, implementing daily checks on intervention completion, and improving systems for tracking and responding to attendance concerns in real time. These efforts contributed to improved attendance outcomes and positioned the school to respond more proactively rather than reactively to chronic absenteeism concerns. School leaders also noted that current year attendance trends indicate even stronger outcomes beyond the Dashboard reporting period.

The effectiveness of Action 5 (Family Engagement Coordinator) and Action 6 (Family Engagement Software) is also reflected in the school's improved family engagement outcomes. The Community Schools Manager played a key role in strengthening communication with families through monthly newsletters, outreach efforts, and coordination of engagement opportunities. Family engagement indicators showed growth across multiple areas, including:

Parent Survey Participation: 63% (increase from 51%)
Parent Education Attendance doubled from last year.
Parent Event Attendance: 17.06% (increase from 10%)

Additionally, 94% of families rated the school positively, maintaining strong overall satisfaction with the school community.

These results demonstrate the effectiveness of the school's efforts to create accessible and responsive systems for family partnership, particularly through more intentional communication and outreach practices. The school also strengthened tracking systems connected to the Parent Ambassador Program, helping improve participation and engagement monitoring.

Overall, the actions under Goal 2 have been effective in promoting a positive and supportive school culture, improving attendance and engagement outcomes, and strengthening relationships between the school and families. While chronic absenteeism remains an area for continued focus, the school's strengthened intervention systems and restorative approaches provide a strong foundation for continued improvement moving forward.

Based on reflection of Year 2 implementation, review of outcome data, and engagement with educational partners, the school will not be making any significant changes to Goal 2, including the overall goal, major actions, or intended areas of focus for the 2026–27 school year. Current actions and systems continue to demonstrate effectiveness in supporting student engagement, school culture, student safety, and family partnership, and the school remains committed to sustaining and refining these efforts as part of the final year of the current three-year LCAP cycle.

However, the school will make minor updates to select target outcomes and actions in order to strengthen alignment to identified student needs and continue improving outcomes for all students, particularly in areas related to attendance, family engagement, and social-emotional supports.

- Metric, 2.2, Suspension Rate: 3-year target was met for all student groups in year 2 for this metric, so new 3-year targets have been set to account for the year 2 achievements.
- Metric 2.4, Dropout Rate: 3-year target was met for all student groups in year 2 for this metric, so new 3-year targets have been set to account for the year 2 achievements.
- Stella High will begin Year 1 implementation of a new cell phone policy during the 2026–27 school year. School leaders recognize that the initial implementation phase will involve ongoing reflection, adjustments, and learning as staff and students establish consistent expectations and routines designed to strengthen student engagement, focus, and school culture.

- The school will also engage in a course audit process to better align course offerings to student interests, postsecondary readiness, and real-world skill development. This includes exploration of expanded coursework and elective opportunities such as financial literacy and other high-interest areas that support student engagement and long-term success.
- Additionally, the school will continue providing ongoing professional development focused on student engagement strategies, instructional relevance, and creating meaningful learning experiences that increase student connection to classroom instruction and school overall.

Overall, the actions under Goal 3 were implemented as planned, with no substantive differences between the intended design and actual execution. The school maintained a consistent focus on ensuring that facilities remained safe and in good repair, operational systems functioned effectively, and students had access to properly credentialed staff and standards-aligned instruction.

Key operational systems were implemented with fidelity, including the provision of operational materials (Action 3.1) and software systems (Action 3.3) to support daily school functions. These resources ensured that staff had the necessary tools to effectively manage instruction, communication, and school operations. In addition, operational personnel and services (Action 3.2) were in place to maintain a safe and supportive learning environment, including custodial services, facilities maintenance, and oversight of school operations. Broader operational services (Action 3.4), such as legal, audit, and compliance-related supports, were also implemented as planned, contributing to overall organizational stability and accountability.

A key success of implementation was the school's ability to maintain safe, functional facilities and consistent operational systems, which supported uninterrupted instruction and a stable learning environment for students and staff. These systems ensured that classrooms remained conducive to learning and that staff were able to focus on delivering high-quality, standards-aligned instruction.

While implementation was strong overall, ongoing attention is required to maintain and continuously improve facilities, operational efficiency, and staffing stability to meet the evolving needs of the school community. Continued investment in these foundational systems will ensure that the school remains well-positioned to support student learning and staff effectiveness.

In summary, Goal 3 actions were fully implemented with fidelity, resulting in stable operations, safe facilities, and the infrastructure necessary to support high-quality instruction. These efforts provide a strong foundation for continued success in delivering standards-aligned educational programs for all students.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The actions implemented under Goal 3 have been effective in maintaining safe, functional, and well-maintained school environments while ensuring students continue to receive standards-aligned instruction from appropriately credentialed staff. Through operational services, facilities maintenance, staffing supports, and technology systems, the school has maintained strong systems that support both daily operations and student learning.

During the 2025–26 school year, all monitored Bright Star schools were found to have sufficient standards-aligned instructional materials available for all students through the Williams monitoring process. Facilities and Safety Inspection scores ranged from 94.53% to 100%, reflecting ratings of Good to Exemplary. This reflects the effectiveness of Actions 1-4, including operational materials, facilities personnel and services, software systems, and contracted operational supports. These actions ensured that school facilities remained clean, safe, and conducive to learning throughout the school year. Custodial services, maintenance supports, operational supplies, and ongoing compliance monitoring contributed to maintaining a positive and secure learning environment for students and staff.

Operational and technology systems also continued to effectively support school functionality and organizational efficiency. Through Action 3 (Software – Operations), staff maintained access to operational platforms and cloud-based systems that support communication, compliance, instructional access, and daily school operations. In addition, operational services provided under Action 4 (Operational Services) ensured continuity in critical functions such as payroll processing, legal and audit compliance, facilities consulting, insurance coverage, and district oversight requirements.

In terms of instructional quality, the school maintained strong implementation of standards-aligned instructional materials and curriculum. 100% of instructional materials were verified as aligned to California State Standards, and 100% of students had access to standards-aligned instructional materials both at school and at home. English Learners also continued to receive instruction aligned to both CCSS and ELD standards, supported through ongoing professional development, curriculum vetting, and instructional coaching structures.

Credentialing and staffing stability also remained areas of effectiveness. According to the most recent SARC data, the school had 4.8 teachers identified as ineffective (decrease from the prior year) under ESSA and 1.3 teachers assigned out-of-field. Staffing and credentialing are monitored regularly to ensure compliance and to support students with appropriately credentialed teachers in all classrooms.

The school also continued to prioritize staff well-being and organizational alignment. Based on staff survey results, 80% of staff reported feeling their workplace is safe, while 92% indicated they understand how their role contributes to the broader mission and vision of the organization. These results reflect continued efforts to foster a positive work environment, maintain strong operational systems, and support staff collaboration and effectiveness.

Overall, the actions under Goal 3 have been effective in supporting safe school facilities, operational stability, credentialed staffing, and access to standards-aligned instruction. Continued implementation of these actions will help ensure students and staff continue to learn and work in environments that are safe, supportive, and aligned to high expectations for teaching and learning.
