Dear Bright Star Community and Supporters,

When I was eight years old, my teacher, Mrs. North, started a penpal program between our 3rd grade class and college students at Loyola Marymount University. We wrote letters to our penpals and visited the university campus. For our culminating project, we stood on a big lawn there and gave speeches in front of our penpals, other college students, and our families. It was the first time I'd given a speech.

When it comes to preparing young people for college, belief is as essential as curriculum. Research shows that students who believe they are capable of going to college—and who understand the steps required to get there—are far more likely to enroll and apply themselves. This confidence, known as *college-going self-efficacy*, can be intentionally developed through consistent school culture and sustained guidance. When children repeatedly hear that college is possible for them, those messages begin to shape their identity and aspirations.

The formula for success is simple but powerful: belief + guidance = access. Students need both inspiration and clear steps to transform potential into action. Effective counseling programs help students plan coursework, complete applications, secure financial aid, and adjust to college life. When these supports are embedded in a school's daily culture—from kindergarten through high school—college prep transforms from a pipedream to a



pipeline. In short, college success begins long before senior year. It begins when a student first hears, "You can do this."



At Bright Star Schools, we ensure every student is prepared and eligible for college because it opens up opportunities for a better life, even if they choose a different higher education pathway. While the majority of our graduates choose 2- and 4-year colleges and universities, some choose trade schools, military service, and the workforce. Whatever pathway they choose after high school graduation, Bright Star is there to help them persist and thrive.

"This belief that college is for all our students," adds Sue Chae, College Counselor and College Prep Instructor at Rise Kohyang High School, "is one of the driving forces behind our consistently high college matriculation rates, which are among the strongest in Los Angeles."

From the earliest grades, Bright Star integrates college awareness into everyday school life. Classrooms are named after universities, hallways are lined with college pennants, and students begin visiting campuses in middle school. Alumni return to share their experiences, helping younger students see tangible examples of success. Equally essential is individualized advising. Bright Star maintains a student-to-counselor ratio of roughly 130:1—far better than the California average of 464:1—ensuring that every student receives personal attention.

Bright Star's support continues long after graduation through its six-year Alumni Support and College Success Program. "We maintain relationships with our graduates, assisting them through college transitions, academic challenges, and financial aid renewal," says Kyle Petrie, Alumni Success Coordinator. "This continuity helps ensure that our alumni not only enroll in college but stay to complete their degrees."



WHAT IS A COMMUNITY SCHOOL AND WHY DO THEY MATTER?



Across California, we see the rise of community schools, where student success is shaped by far more than what happens during the school day. Health, safety, family stability, and community belonging all influence how a child learns and grows. Community schools respond to this reality by weaving together academics, social services, family engagement, and enrichment opportunities into one integrated support system—right on campus.

Rather than operate in isolation, community schools form deep partnerships with local organizations, health providers, businesses, and government agencies. These partnerships bring critical supports—such as mental health counseling, after-school programs, food assistance, and family workshops—directly to students and their families. In doing so, they remove barriers that often stand between students and their potential.

The California Department of Education defines community schools as a whole-child, whole-family, whole-community approach to education. Backed by the California Community Schools Partnership Program (CCSPP), the state has invested billions of dollars to expand this model across the state. The goal is to ensure that every child—regardless of ZIP code—has access to not only strong academics, but also to the safety nets and enrichment that nurture long-term success.

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This model is particularly powerful in diverse, high-need regions such as Southern California. In many neighborhoods, schools are among the few stable institutions families can count on. When schools open their doors beyond the traditional school day—to host health clinics, community meetings, food drives, or college workshops—they cultivate trust, belonging, and shared responsibility between educators, families, and local partners.

A model for Community Schools in action.

In 2025, all nine Bright Star schools became official, state-recognized Community Schools and were awarded a \$12 million grant from the state of California to continue providing robust wraparound support and services to students, families, and communities. This is a testament to our deep commitment to serving students, families, and neighborhoods as interconnected communities of care.

Bright Star Schools has been intentional about the communities we serve. Our Community School models serve three distinct and amazing communities of LA County. In each cluster we serve, we have an elementary, middle, and high school to ensure our students stay with Bright Star from TK through 12th grade.

Our most recent impact includes:

- Establishing over 50 partnerships with community organizations focusing on health, housing, well-being, mental health, and more
- Providing free eye exams and over 200 pairs of free eyeglasses to our students
- Providing new shoes, backpacks full of school supplies, holiday toys, and laptops to students and families
- Facilitating Community School Advisory Councils at each site where students, families, staff, and partners collaborate

Partnerships that Strengthen Communities

"Community schools are powered by partnerships with health providers, local nonprofits, mental health agencies, and local organizations" says Ruth Kim, Principal of Rise Kohyang Middle School. "Through these collaborations, Bright Star connects families to resources that address housing insecurity, nutrition, and access to healthcare."

Family engagement is central to the model. Gene Castro, Principal of Stella Elementary Charter Academy explains, "Each school maintains community advisory councils that bring together parents, staff, and local partners to shape priorities and programming. Families aren't just recipients of services. They are co-creators of the school community."

A Continuum of Support from TK-12 and Beyond


Another core component that sets Bright Star apart is its comprehensive TK-12 continuum, paired with a unique Alumni Support Program that continues for six years after graduation. Bright Star's support doesn't end with a diploma. It extends into college and career, ensuring that graduates have the guidance and stability they need to persist and succeed.


This long-term investment has produced exceptional outcomes. Bright Star boasts high graduation rates—consistently above 90%—and nearly universal UC/CSU eligibility for its graduates. Jennifer Anaya, Principal of Valor Academy High School, says, "A lot of our students are the first in their families to attend college, and hundreds have gone on to succeed in higher education and professional careers, carrying their community's hopes with them."




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A bright future for L.A.'s First Suburb



The West Adams, Baldwin Hills and South Los Angeles communities are diverse and historically rich neighborhoods, home to a vibrant mix of Latino, Black, and immigrant families who bring deep cultural pride and community spirit. Yet, like many urban areas, these communities have long faced systemic inequities—under-resourced public schools, economic instability, and barriers to academic opportunity. Our Stella schools were founded here to help close those gaps, offering residents high-quality, collegepreparatory education within their own community. The Community School approach strengthens family partnerships, creates access to social supports, and fosters a sense of belonging that empowers the entire neighborhood.

This year, Bright Star's high school graduations were even brighter! In early June, seven Bright Star Schools graduates from Stella High Charter Academy (SHCA) received college degrees along with their high school diplomas.

Our students – six seniors and one junior – participated in SHCA's dual-enrollment program with LA Southwest College. During high school, they worked hard to excel in both their high school and college courses. All grads earned associates degrees, with some students earning multiple associates degrees. Additionally, they were all accepted into top four-year universities:

- Zuleimy C., 2 AA degrees, attending UC Berkeley
- Angelina D., 3 AA degrees, attending UCLA, then medical school
- Alexandra E., 1 AA degree, attending UC San Diego
- Brianna R., 1 AA degree, attending UCLA
- Keily R., attending 1 AA degree, Cal Poly San Luis Obispo
- Tyler S., 1 AA degree, attending UC Berkeley
- Julio T., 1 AA degrees, attending UC Davis



Bringing diversity together

Koreatown, or "K-Town," is a densely populated and culturally rich neighborhood in central Los Angeles. Home to over 100,000 residents, the area boasts a diverse demographic: approximately 37% Asian (primarily Korean), 31% Latino, and smaller percentages of Black and White residents. While the community boasts cultural vibrancy, Koreatown families face challenges such as high-density living, limited green spaces, and a high cost of living. All of these factors contribute to the need for the accessible, high-quality education and wraparound support provided by Rise Kohyang schools. Our Community School approach is particularly vital in Koreatown.






Tending to a Fertile Valley

As I get ready to graduate, it's bittersweet. I'll miss Valor deeply, but I'm so grateful to be part of something that's changed my life in every way."


